## **Course Description**

This course will give an introduction to the core issues underlying the Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR). This course will have out of class and in-class components. Over the course of the semester, students will independently complete the CITI Online RCR course. In addition, there will be supplemental assignments in preparation for in-class discussions, and in some weeks we may have outside speakers addressing specific RCR topics. The Final Assignment will be a Case Study that you will explore and present as small groups, reflecting your critical engagement of the course material.
